DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST,

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD:

With the Feast of the Epiphany, we recall the visit of the Magi to Jesus who presented him with the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The Scriptures are silent on the number of Magi who visited Jesus. Due to the three gifts the assumption was made there were probably three magi. While the Scriptures also do not record their names, they have come to be referred to as Melchior, Balthasar, and Caspar.

The significance of this feast is to attest to the fact that Jesus came to save everyone and not just members of the Jewish people. Yes, there is a universal call to salvation. We rejoice in this fact as you and I of gentile stock are also benefactors of the saving work of Jesus, whose birth we celebrate during this wonderful Christmas Season.

I know that members of certain cultures, for example, those of the Latino cultures, celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany as even more significant than Christmas Day itself. In fact, gifts are exchanged on this feast instead of Christmas day itself. I'm sure this has created challenges for families who usually did this but are now assimilating into our American culture.

THE REUNION OF THE TWELVE TRIBES OF ISRAEL:

A thought that I came across a number of years ago was made by an author writing about the reunification of the Twelve Tribes of Israel, dispersed several thousand years ago. His position was that this is actually happening through the work of the Catholic Church. As the Gospel is being proclaimed throughout the world, and Jewish people are converting to Catholicism, the Twelve Tribes are being reunited in and through the Catholic Church.

An interesting thought to consider. While this might be the singular position of this author, as this never came up in any of my studies, before or after my ordination to the priesthood, I was inspired by the suggestion that God's reunification the first Chosen people, the Twelve Tribes of Israel, is being fulfilled. How often God's plans are not identical to our thoughts and/or expectations.

Christmas Day was two weeks ago. I hope that many of you were able to spend some quality time with family members or friends, by enjoying a meal, or just being able to be with each other. Perhaps, they were your guests at your home, or you had the opportunity to visit with them during this Christmas Season. These special gatherings bring us much joy and satisfaction. Celebrating Christmas and the beginning of this New Year with you has been a special source of my personal joy. You are my family!

WEEKLY READINGS AND OBSERVANCES

The Epiphany of the Lord

January 5, 2025

First Reading:

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you. (Is 60:1)

Psalm:

Lord, every nation on earth will adore you. (Ps 72)

Second Reading:

It was not made known to people in other generations as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: that the Gentiles are coheirs, members of the same body, and copartners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

(Eph 3:5-6)

Gospel:

"Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." (Mt 2:2)

Gospel Meditation:

Have you ever wondered *why* the magi had gold, frankincense, and myrrh? Matthew's Gospel tells us, "Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh" (Matt. 2:11). Why are these things their "treasures"? One possible answer is they were magicians and astrologers, and these three items were the tools of their questionable trade. In offering them to Christ, they demonstrate that they will cease using such items to predict or control life. They place this baby-king, the God of Israel, at the center of their lives, and not their own devices of control, manipulation and prediction.

Isn't that what we need to do, too? Consider, for example, the magical power of money, symbolized by the magi's gold. Seemingly whatever we ask of money, it does. It wields a god-like power over the world. It can predict the future by guaranteeing better outcomes for us — which is why it is such a tempting alternative to trusting in God. The problem is such absolute trust in money enslaves us to the economic forces that make money so powerful. In paying homage to Jesus with "gold" (i.e., tithing), we participate in his authority over (and therefore freedom from) the magical sway of money.

What things in your life do you use to predict or control your future? What in your life seems to give you power over the world? Those are your treasures. Are you tired of feeling enslaved to them? Find a way to open them and give them to Christ, and you will be freer.

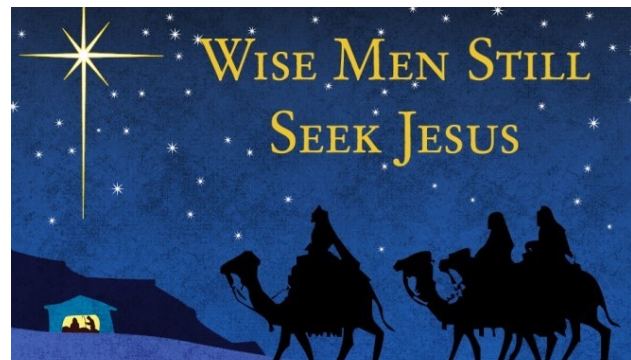
What's Happening In Faith Formation??

Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany.

The Season of Christmas reaches it's pinnacle, Jesus, the savior is revealed to all the world with the visitation of the 3 visitors from the East. The magi's gifts were not simply a demonstration of wealth – they conveyed deeper meaning. The **GOLD** represents Jesus' kingship.

The **FRANKINCENSE** represents Jesus' deity. In the Old Testament, frankincense was traditionally burned in the temple as an offering to God (Leviticus 2:2). By bringing this gift, the Magi affirmed Jesus was no ordinary man; he is both fully man and fully God. The **MYRRH** Commonly used to embalm bodies, foreshadows Jesus' death. We see in John 19:38-40 that Nicodemus brought myrrh at the time of Jesus' burial. In this way, the full story of Jesus' coming is revealed. Jesus was born so that we might have salvation.

Through Jesus' death, we have eternal life.



Fun fact about the 3 Wiseman:

Caspar: Traditionally depicted as a young man, Caspar is associated with the gift of frankincense. He is also known as "Jaspar" and is said to have come from India.

Melchior: Often depicted as an older man, Melchior is associated with the gift of gold. He is said to have come from Persia.

Balthazar: Traditionally depicted as a middle-aged man, Balthazar is associated with the gift of myrrh. He is said to have come from Arabia.

Question: Besides the Wise Men, what is significant about the Epiphany?

Q & A

Answer: Epiphany means "manifestation," or public display. In the US, it is celebrated on the Sunday nearest to January 6. It originates from a story unique to Matthew (2:1-12). Magi from the East come to offer homage to the newborn King, presenting him with gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. This part of Matthew's infancy narrative differs from Luke's account of the birth of Jesus. In Luke there are no Magi, star, nor gifts. Luke has Jesus being born in a stable after Mary and Joseph's long travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Matthew seems to have the family living in a house in Bethlehem, where the Magi find them. Why these differences? They stem from the needs and concerns of the audience the authors were addressing, as well as the theological stance of each author. Since Matthew was writing primarily to a Jewish community, his concern was to show that Jesus did not come just for Jews, but for Gentiles as well. From his very birth, Jesus not only manifests himself to Jews, but also to Gentiles, who are prominently included in the manifestation, symbolized by the Magi and their journey. This is the most significant aspect of the feast of Epiphany. How do you manifest Jesus to all with whom you come into contact?

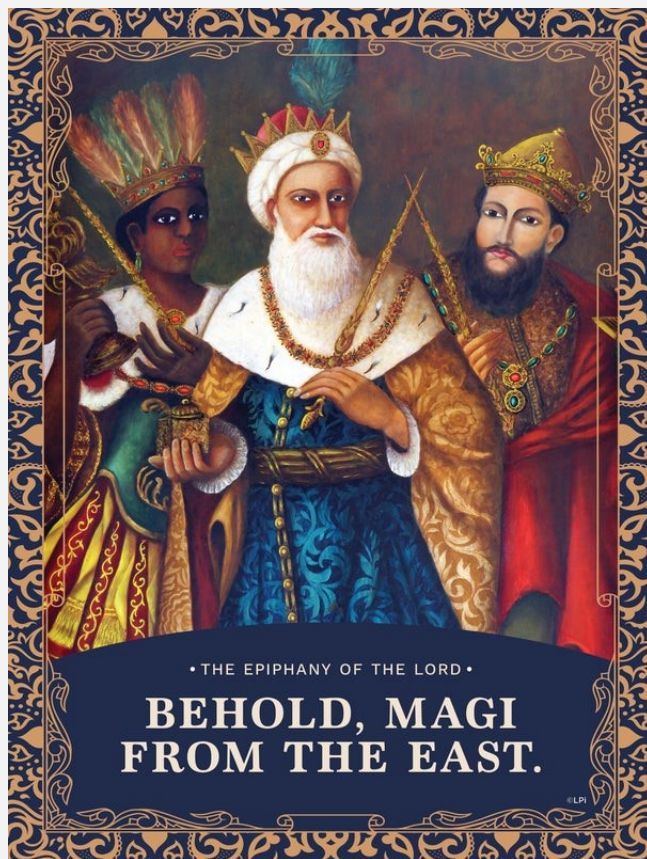
