A Note from the Pastor

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST:

WORLD MISSION SUNDAY: This Sunday the Church is celebrating World Mission Sunday. Pope Leo XIV reflected, *"I urge every Catholic parish in the world to take part in World Mission Sunday. Your prayers, your support will help spread the Gospel, provide for pastoral and catechetical programs, help to build new churches, and care for the health and educational needs of our brothers and sisters in mission territories."*

"This October 19th, as we reflect together on our baptismal call to be 'missionaries of hope among the peoples,'" the Pope encouraged, "let us commit ourselves anew to the sweet and joyful task of bringing Christ Jesus our Hope to the ends of the earth."

As we celebrate World Mission Sunday it is important that we reflect on Pope Leo's words that through our Baptism we are called to be *"missionaries of hope. . .bringing Christ Jesus our Hope to the ends of the earth."*

Certainly, our prayers are crucial in supporting this work. At appropriate times we also give financial assistance to support these efforts as well. May the Lord bless all those involved in missionary service and all who support them.

RELEASING OF THE HOSTAGES: What great news that President Trump's Peace Plan in the Middle East began this past Tuesday, October 13th. There is so much excitement in Israel, the West Bank and Gaza. The release of the captives has caused so my joy among so many as they welcome home their family members and friends.

Please keep this magnificent peace plan in your prayers. This could be the start of a lasting peace in the Middle East, which has not been the case for many years. I am grateful to all the Nation's Leaders for cooperating and making this peace plan possible.

As President Trump addressed the Mideast Peace Summit in Egypt last Tuesday, he referred to the release of all the hostages as *"An historic dawn for peace in the Middle East."* This is an area that has experienced hostility for many years.

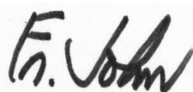
THE EXISTENCE OF PURGATORY: I recently read a comment by a Protestant Biblical Scholar, *"The idea of Purgatory is unbiblical. It teaches that Christ's Atonement is not enough."* This is a very interesting comment.

The Catholic Church teaches the existence of Purgatory to deal with "temporal punishment" due to sin. Yes, the Passion and Death of Jesus atoned for our sins. However, what remains is the temporal punishment due to sin.

I believe that it is Taylor Marshall, a Catholic Biblical Scholar, who refers to Purgatory as *"heaven's hospital."* Since nothing imperfect can enter Heaven, purgatory is a place of final purification and healing.

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, purgatory is "a state of final purification after death and before entrance into heaven for those who died in God's friendship but were only imperfectly purified; a final cleansing of human imperfection before one is able to enter the joy of heaven." A soul which has completely rejected God chooses for itself the punishment of hell. A soul which is purified completely of sin in this life, on the other hand, is brought immediately into eternal rest in heaven (and is therefore a saint, whether canonized or not!). But for the other souls—not damnable but not yet perfected in grace—the Church recognizes a period of purification.

Do you understand and accept the teaching of the Catholic Church on the existence and necessity of Purgatory? I think that this teaching gives us substantial proof that God, and the Church, desire our salvation.

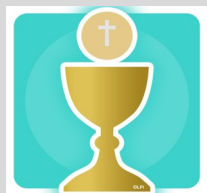

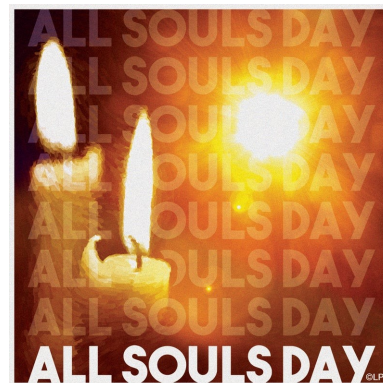

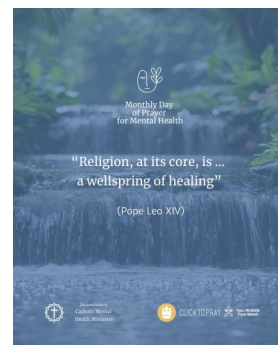
Enrolling in the All Soul's Novena

GOSPEL MEDITATION

A woman in my parish has an adult son who has rejected his faith. She prays for him every day. She lights candles, says rosaries, and asks God again and again to bring him back. But nothing changes. Is God listening? Is He delaying? She told me once that she feels like the widow in Jesus' strange parable — crying out for justice, but hearing only silence. And yet, she said, she is at peace. I asked why. She responded, "God is *already* answering. I just can't see it yet."

She embodies something of the mystery in Jesus' parable this week in Luke 18. A powerless widow demands justice from a corrupt judge. This isn't about wearing God down until He gives in. It's about faith in the justice that is already coming. The widow isn't just persistent; she believes that justice is inevitable. And when Jesus points to the judge's words — his fear of being "struck" — He hints at something deeper: God's justice does not creep in gradually. It strikes. It comes like lightning.

Blessed Mary is, of course, the ultimate widow demanding justice. At the foot of the cross she stands before what looks like the ultimate injustice — the brutal execution of her son. But she did not despair. She did not beg for a last-minute rescue. She knew that justice was not delayed. In fact, it was happening. The power of the cross was already unleashing justice upon the world — suddenly, decisively, like a blow that would topple every corrupt power, making even the most corrupt fear her strike.

This parable asks us: will the Son of Man find faith on earth? Or will we mistake God's silence for absence? The cross proves that justice is not slow. It is only hidden. The lightning has already struck. In the cross, justice is speedily being done.

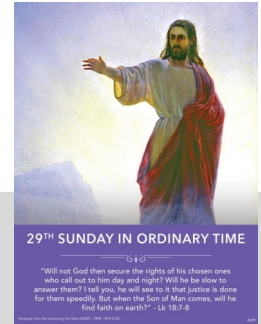

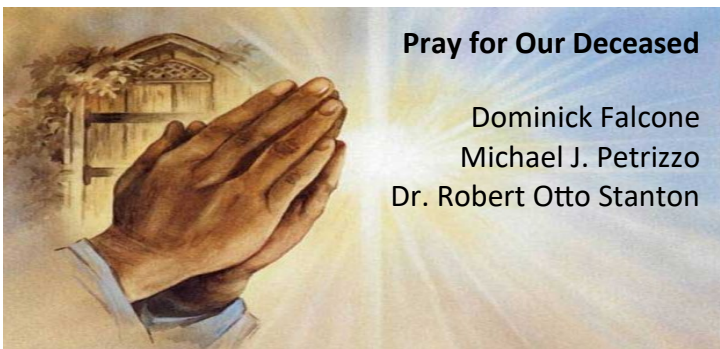

Question: I volunteer every once in a while. How can I incorporate serving the poor in my everyday life?

Q & A

Answer: In the Gospels, Jesus is very clear about emphasizing outreach to vulnerable persons on the margins of society. These may be the materially poor, the disabled, the lonely, or any others whose circumstances drive them from mainstream society. We can all respond to Christ's call to love by incorporating direct service into our regular life routine. Here are some ideas to find your niche: **Consider your life.** Before you look for direct service opportunities, consider your schedule, commitment levels, and personal gifts. When can you help out and how regularly? Where have you volunteered in the past that has felt like a good fit? Do you have any particular skills or personality traits that lend you to particular work? **Do some research.** There are a lot of structured ways you can get involved in your community. Your parish might have a social concerns outreach program. If not, ask friends and family. A simple online search for local nonprofits can also expose you to new opportunities. **Be open to God's invitation.** The chance to serve may be closer than you think. Befriending an elderly neighbor, widowed and far from children, is an act of serving the poor. Keep your eyes and heart open!
