A Note from the Pastor

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST:

A PARISH NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION: In my pastor's letter last weekend I suggested that we all consider making a common New Year's Resolution. I am hoping we can remedy the current lack of appreciation for the true meaning of the Sacrament of the Eucharist and find an appropriate and proper way to enter the celebration of the Mass. How important it is that we make this resolution together since we all have an impact on the quality of the Mass celebration.

PROPER LITURGICAL PAUSES: Based on a summary of the time and place of appropriate pauses I would suggest the following for your serious consideration and cooperation.

"Liturgical pauses are intentional periods of silence within religious services designed to foster reflection, prayer, and a deeper connection with the spiritual message. They occur at specific times in the liturgy, such as after a reading or the homily, or after communion, and serve to allow for personal contemplation, thanksgiving, and a 'positive stillness' of the mind to be filled with the meaning of the service.

Purposes of Liturgical pauses

- 1) *Recollection and meditation: Silence allows individuals to process the scriptures and the homily, moving the focus from external noise to internal reflection.*
- 2) *Preparation: Periods of silence help prepare the heart and mind for prayer, allowing the congregation to form their own response to what they have heard.*
- 3) *Thanksgiving: A pause after communion is specifically designed as a time for personal and collective thanksgiving for the Eucharist.*
- 4) *Presence: These moments encourage being present with God without the need for words, creating a space for a more profound spiritual encounter.*

Examples of where they occur

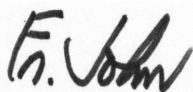
- 1) *Before the Liturgy of the Word: To gather thoughts and bring personal intentions to the service.*
- 2) *After the readings: To meditate on the scripture that has been proclaimed.*
- 3) *After the homily: To reflect on the message delivered and to prepare a response in prayer.*
- 4) *After communion: To offer thanksgiving for the gift of the Eucharist.*

Significance and approach

- 1) *Intentional and positive: According to Pope Benedict XVI, this is not 'an emptying meditation' but a 'silence with content' that helps a deeper understanding of the liturgy.*
- 2) *Fosters participation: This internal, silent participation is considered just as vital as the external actions of the liturgy.*
- 3) *Resists haste: The intentional silence helps to counteract a sense of being rushed, which can hinder spiritual growth and the ability to enter a deeper encounter with Christ."*

THE CATHOLIC BELIEF OF THE EUCHARIST: Next week I will follow up with a conversation on the Catholic Church's understanding of the Eucharist. It's disturbing to follow the studies that seem to indicate that most Catholics ((70%) do not believe the Catholic Church's teaching on the Eucharist, that the Eucharist is the true presence of the resurrected Christ under the sacramental presence of bread and wine.

Please consider what I have written above about liturgical pauses. Next week I will share with you how we can deepen our understanding of the Catholic teaching on the Eucharist.

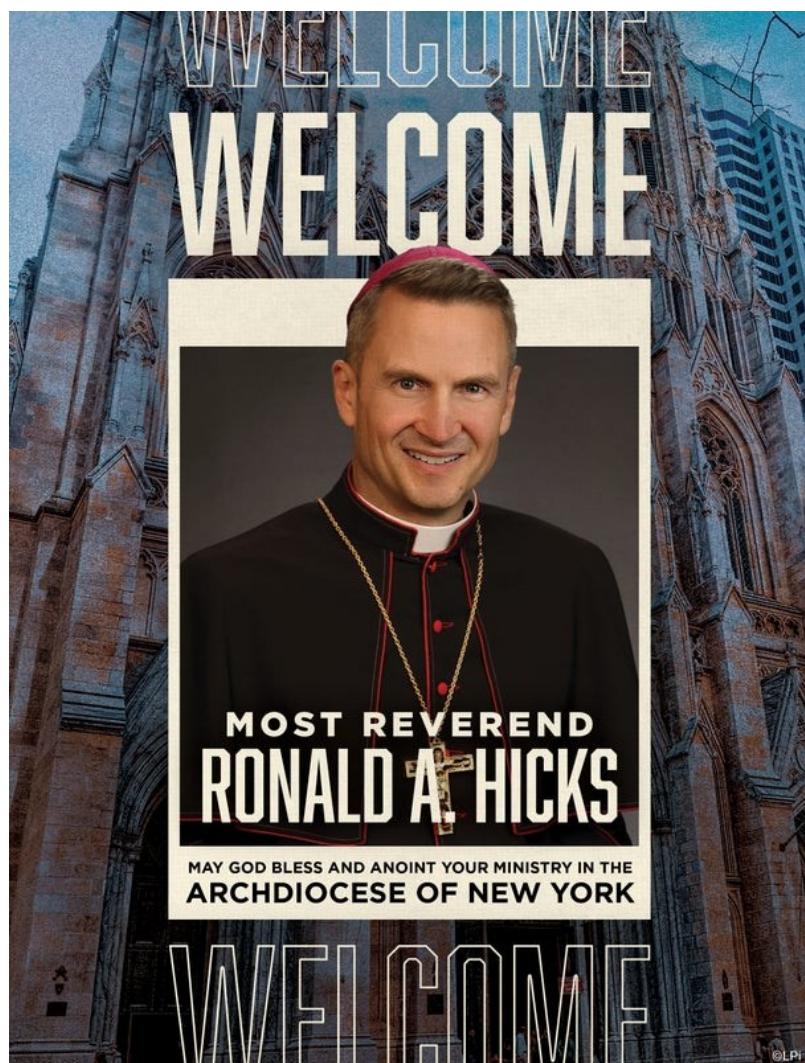


20 + C + M + B + 26

The Feast of the Epiphany is considered a fitting time for the blessing of homes. Please cut out the above sign posting it on the top of your front door, either on the outside or inside. It contains the Cross, with the present year and the initials of the three wise men Caspar, Melchior and Balthazar:

20+C+M+B+26. The initials C+M+B can also be interpreted to mean *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, (*Christ bless this house*).

It should remain posted on your door until the Feast of the Presentation, which falls on February 2, 2026. It can remain posted for the entire year.

Fun fact about the 3 Wiseman:

Caspar: Traditionally depicted as a young man, Caspar is associated with the gift of frankincense. He is also known as "Jaspar" and is said to have come from India.

Melchior: Often depicted as an older man, Melchior is associated with the gift of gold. He is said to have come from Persia.

Balthazar: Traditionally depicted as a middle-aged man, Balthazar is associated with the gift of myrrh. He is said to have come from Arabia.



Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany. The Season of Christmas reaches it's pinnacle, Jesus, the savior is revealed to all the world with the visitation of the 3 visitors from the East.

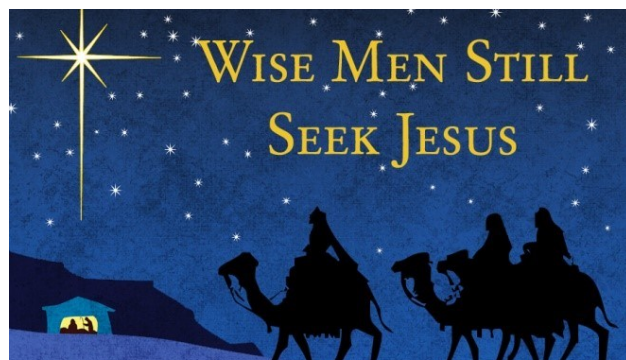
The magi's gifts were not simply a demonstration of wealth – they conveyed deeper meaning.

The **GOLD** represents Jesus' kingship.

The **FRANKINCENSE** represents Jesus' deity. In the Old Testament, frankincense was traditionally burned in the temple as an offering to God (Leviticus 2:2). By bringing this gift, the Magi affirmed Jesus was no ordinary man; he is both fully man and fully God.

The **MYRRH** Commonly used to embalm bodies, foreshadows Jesus' death. We see in John 19:38-40 that Nicodemus brought myrrh at the time of Jesus' burial.

In this way, the full story of Jesus' coming is revealed. Jesus was born so that we might have salvation. Through Jesus' death, we have eternal life.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

When I was 22, I went on a pilgrimage to Rome for the Jubilee Year of 2000. I was traveling light with just a backpack, one blue shirt and black pants, little money, and no Italian. I had a few close friends and one goal: to reach the Eternal City. Despite the challenges and deprivations, I felt alive in a way I had never known before.

When do you feel most alive? I'd wager it's not when you're most comfortable or surrounded by stuff. Rather, it's when your life is aimed at something great; when you're on a meaningful and challenging journey with good friends.

That's the image the Magi give us in today's Gospel. They set out from the East not with certainty, but with hope. They study the signs, discipline their attention, and journey together, offering the best they have when they find the newborn King.

The Church gives us their story at the start of the year to reawaken something in us. We are not meant to drift. We're meant to journey as pilgrims. The Jubilee Year of 2025 may have ended, but our pilgrimage has not. Like the magi, the closer we get to Christ, the more alive we become.

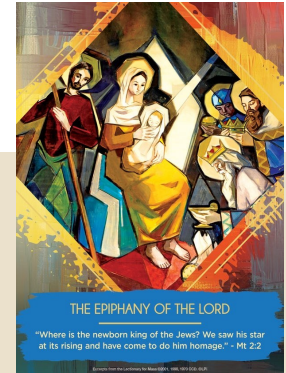

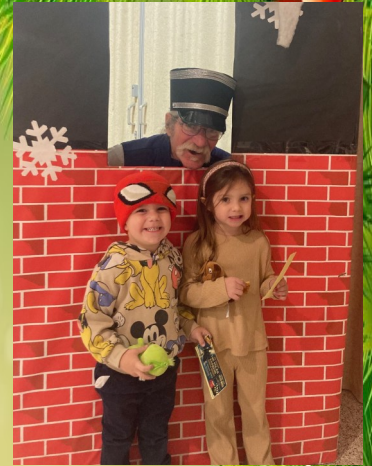

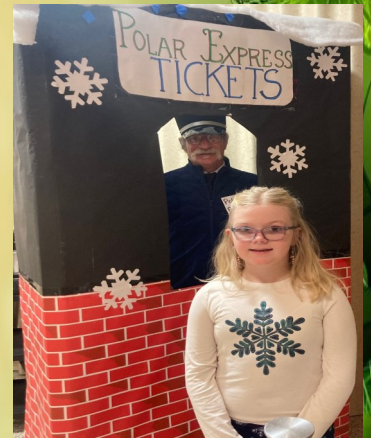

Bishop Barres' Statement on Governor Hochul's Plan to Sign Assisted Suicide Bill

December 17, 2025

Governor Hochul's decision to sign into law the assisted suicide bill is a tragedy and a grave moral failure. In explaining her decision, the governor invoked personal liberty—the right of the individual to make determinations about the direction of his/her life. Sadly, this law facilitates abuse and manipulation of the elderly, the disabled, and those who suffer from mental or emotional illnesses. As a society, we must care for the suffering with compassion, upholding the dignity of all life, not legitimize the tragic path too many choose to escape their burdens. This sends a terrible message of despair to young people who struggle with depression and anxiety.

The governor's statement references her reflections during a funeral Mass on the compassion of God. She is profoundly misled. Jesus calls us to help the suffering to carry their crosses with love, not to participate in the willful taking of a life. Christ is the Divine Physician who cured the sick and restored the dead to life, taking pity on those who wept and mourned at the loss of a loved one. The Lord gives life, even to the suffering, and receives them upon their natural deaths into “the life of the world to come.”

Our Catholic institutions cannot and will not participate in physician-assisted suicide. We will continue to proclaim the love of God for every individual person, created in His image, that endures in every circumstance, and we will never abandon the sick and suffering to death. We will care for them until the end of their natural lives.

Question: Magi, Three Kings, Three Wise Men...who were they?

Q & A

Answer: We sing songs, give gifts, and move three mysterious men into our manger scenes. There's a rich heritage in the Catholic Church of celebrating the magi, but their origins are steeped in mystery. The original Greek calls these men *magoi*. The word is translated elsewhere in Scripture to mean "magician," but a similar word was used in ancient history to describe an entirely different set of people altogether. In what is now modern-day Iran, the ruling empire had a wealthy priestly caste known as the Magi. At the time of Christ, the Magi formed one of the ruling councils of the Parthian Empire. These priests interpreted dreams and read the stars to anticipate major events that could affect the fortunes of the empire. We're not exactly sure where the magi of the Gospels traveled from. Matthew simply says "the east." History tells us that the ancient regions of Persia, Assyria, and Babylon all had a magi priesthood at the time of Christ. Whichever region they hailed from, they likely traveled over one thousand miles over the course of several months to arrive at the Holy Family. Unfortunately for the classic song, there is no concrete evidence these men were themselves kings, though they did bear gifts "from afar" at the prompting of their astronomical calculations.

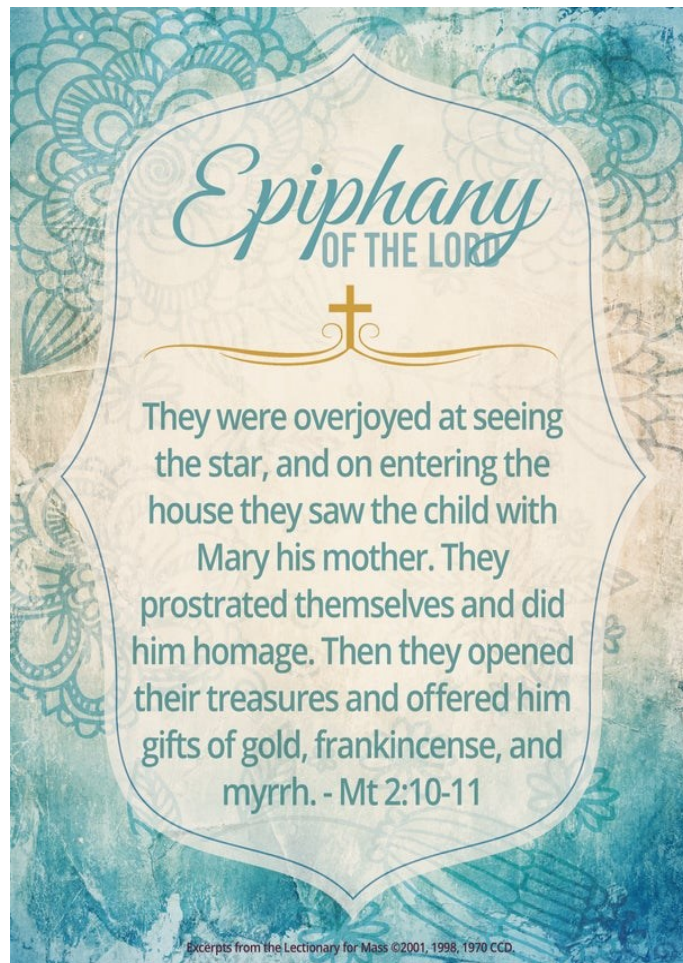
