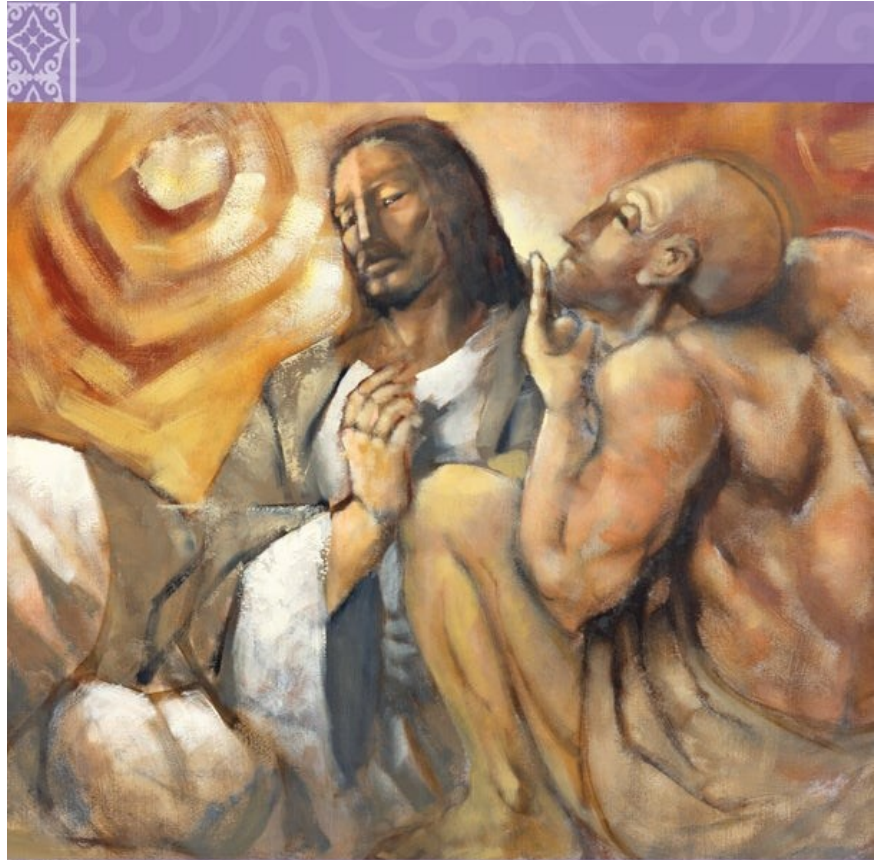
OUR MISSION

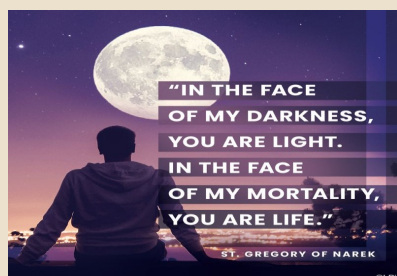

A Note from the Pastor

DEAR BROTHERS AND SISTERS IN CHRIST:

WE HAVE ENTERED THE SACRED SEASON OF LENT: This past Wednesday, February 18th, was Ash Wednesday the beginning of the Season of Lent. Our Sacred duty is *“to remove all that is not yet Christ in us.”* I hope that the examination of conscience that I published in my pastor’s letter last week assisted you in considering what *“is not yet Christ in you.”*

THE SIMPLEST DEFINITION OF SIN: The Letter of James gives the simplest and clearest definition of sin. The Letter of James 4:17 states that *“if you know the right thing to do and you don’t do it you have sinned.”* A rather simple definition.

I think that because of our upbringing we have learned the essential difference between right and wrong. It is important to be able to understand this difference and how to apply it to our daily behavior.

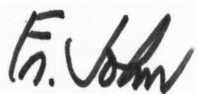
I am amazed at the number of people who will come to me in confession, not knowing what to confess. They tell me, *“I haven’t murdered anyone.”* To me this is a clear indication that they have a poorly formed conscience. It is so important that we form our consciences so that we can be more aware of the presence of sin in our lives.

THE CALL OF ASH WEDNESDAY: The reception of ashes on Ash Wednesday is our personal commitment to enter fully into Lent. When the ashes were placed on us, we heard the call, *“turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel.”* It is the church’s hope that during the next forty days we will observe Lent through acts of prayer, fasting and good works.

Our participation in Sunday Mass will give us the teachings of Jesus. The role of the priest or deacon, during his homily, is to assist us in applying these teachings to our daily lives. Sometimes our greatest sin is not acknowledging the presence of sin in us.

LENTEN OPPORTUNITIES: Each Wednesday during Lent we will have a special Holy Hour at 7:30 PM during which we will place ourselves before the exposed Blessed Sacrament and have the opportunity to listen a homily delivered by a priest or deacon (consult the schedule on page 4). Please check the bulletin or website for additional Lenten Spiritual Programs.

As we begin Lent, I pray that all of us will make ongoing spiritual progress over the next forty days.

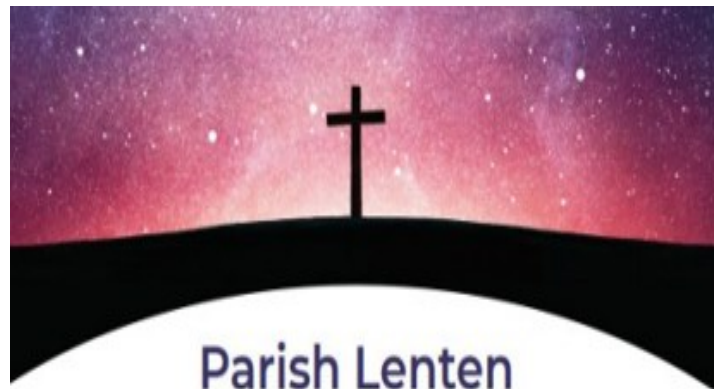

FEBRUARY

SUN 22

The season of Lent lasts for forty days. Use this or another calendar to count how many 40 days is with younger children. Consider how you will use this time to pray, to ask God for his forgiveness, and to help those in need.

MON 23

"Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me." Mt 25:40

Look for ways to treat each person you encounter today as you would treat Jesus.

TUE 24

"This is how you are to pray: Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name." Mt 6:9

Offer an Our Father together. Pray it slowly and pay attention to each word and phrase.

WED 25

"A clean heart create for me, O God, and a steadfast spirit renew within me." Ps 51:12

Be aware of your words and actions today. How can you make each one more loving and kind?

THU 26

"Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." Mt 7:7

"But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you." Mt 5:44

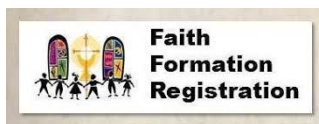

Prayer & Worship

GOSPEL MEDITATION

In my second-to-last year of seminary, I woke up one September morning to devastating news: two beloved classmates had died in a car crash. I was overwhelmed with grief and anger like I had never known. I entered therapy for the first time and had intense conversations with my spiritual director. For months I felt lost in a spiritual wilderness. But something unexpected happened: I encountered Christ there. The fear and sorrow didn't destroy me. In fact, that spiritual desert was a time of intense growth in faith.

Today's Gospel begins: **"Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil" (Matthew 4:1).** The word "led" denotes a gentle, humble submission to the Spirit. Jesus does not send himself into this desolate place where wild beasts roam and Satan tempts. Who wants to be around roaming, wild beasts? The Church Fathers saw them as symbols of our inner chaos: fears, temptations, wounds. The Spirit leads us there, sometimes against our wishes. But those same Fathers also saw that this deserted place is also where angels ministered to Jesus, amidst his great trial and temptation.

Lenten Challenge: This Lent and throughout life's struggles, the Spirit leads you and me into the wilderness. Name one "desert" into which the Spirit has led you: perhaps grief, fear, silence, change, disappointment. Ask for the grace to go there willingly. The beasts may be real, but they will not harm you. There, the angels are waiting to minister to the Christ living in you, who always goes where the Spirit leads.

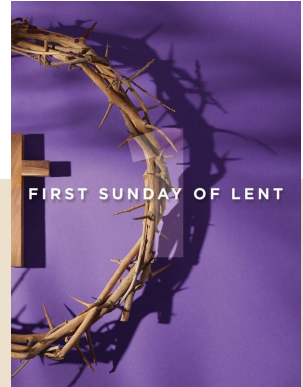

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

In this Lenten season 2026, we offer our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving for the Light of Christ's peace and justice to heal the many troubled parts of our nation and world.

Amid so many global and national crises, it is essential that we be guided and inspired by the Word of God. This Lent, let us rededicate ourselves to being deeply biblical Catholics on fire with the Word of God.¹

In Saint Paul's Second Letter to Timothy (2:8-10), the Apostle writes: "The Word of God is not bound," or as another translation renders it, "The Word of God cannot be chained."

The Church of Santa Maria in Via Lata in Rome, near to both the Trevi Fountain and the Pantheon, is traditionally taken as the site of Saint Paul's imprisonment in the Eternal City. Beneath this holy church stands an ancient, freestanding granite column that I visited and prayed at on May 17, 2024.

Etched into that ancient column is the Latin phrase for "The Word of God is not bound." The column also has rust marks indicating that a chain – possibly the one discovered archaeologically in an adjacent well – was wrapped around it.

How powerful it was to place my hands on that granite column and to touch with my fingers the words of Saint Paul! In my ecclesial mission as the Successor of the Apostles on Long Island, that memorable day I asked Saint Paul for his intercession that each one of us in the Diocese of Rockville Centre could be as bold and as audacious in proclaiming that the Word of God cannot be chained!

The Word of God cannot be chained in our own lives and in the lives of our families!

The Word of God bursts through our sin, paralyses, and resistances to change, and ignites our own Road to Damascus conversions!

The Word of God breaks down the self-imposed prison doors of addiction, ego, pride, selfishness, and narcissism, and refocuses our lives on Christ and his call to rejoice!

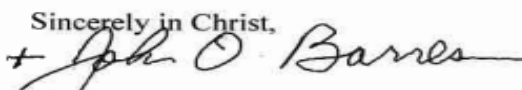
The Word of God cannot be chained by sin, war, terrorism, racism, injustice, poverty,² or disrespect for the sanctity and dignity of human life!

The Word of God cannot be chained by unethical deployments of Artificial Intelligence!³

The Word of God cannot be chained in the global mission of the Catholic Church, regardless of the 21st century persecutions and martyrdoms she experiences!⁴

As the Successor of the Apostles on Long Island, and in communion and mission with our Holy Father Pope Leo XIV, I thank each of you for the way you "cast fire on the earth" (Luke 12:49) through your daily reading, meditating, praying, contemplating, and living the inspired Sacred Scriptures.

Be assured of my prayers for a blessed Lent.

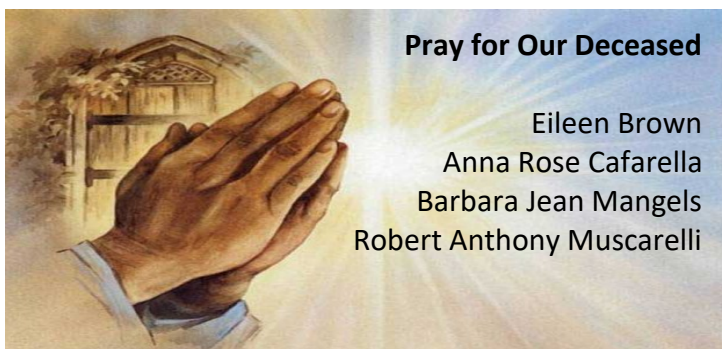

Question: What does Jesus mean when he talks about taking up our cross?

Q & A

Answer: Our journey of faith begins in baptism. When we are faithful to it, we find God's plan for us, his way of allowing us to participate in his saving work, which in turn becomes for us our own salvation. Stated simply, we share in the mission of Jesus each day. We live our life with all of its ups, downs, joys, and sorrows in union with the mission of Jesus. Our work then is holy. It is joined to the cross, God's will for Jesus — the way in which he destroys sin and death and makes eternal life possible. His sacrifice accomplishes what we ourselves cannot do. To take up the cross, then, means that we share in the mission of Jesus and so embrace the sufferings of the cross. It is our daily life made holy, given a redemptive mission. It is our purpose and goal to unite our life to that of Christ. St. Paul says it best, "If we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection" (Rom 6:5).
